The Blue Star became an icon in World War II and was seen on flags and banners in homes for sons and daughters away at war, as well as in churches and businesses. The Blue Star Memorial Program of the National Garden Club, Inc. was created to honor service men and women. This program began with the planting of 8,000 Dogwood trees by the New Jersey Council of Garden Clubs in 1944 as a living memorial to veterans of World War II. In 1945 the National Council of State Garden Clubs adopted the program and began a Blue Star Highway system which covers thousands of miles across the Continental United States, Alaska and Hawaii.



A large metal Blue Star Memorial Highway Marker was placed at appropriate locations along the way. The program was eventually expanded to include all men and women who had served or were serving or would serve in the armed services of the United States. Memorial Markers and By-Way Markers were added to the Highway Markers, to be used at locations such as National cemeteries, parks, veteran's facilities and gardens. The Mason County Garden Club, along with area veterans organizations, placed and maintain the Blue Star Marker on the front lawn of the Mason County Courthouse.

SOMETHING TO DO IN YOUR GARDEN NOW!

- Conserve moisture
- Add several inches of mulch around each plant, which should slow water evaporation.
- Consider a drip irrigation system. Its flexibility enables you to place the water source directly at each plant and control water output.

- Water early in the morning or late at night, which will reduce evaporation.
- Plant drought tolerant native plants. They will add texture, color and interest to the garden, while saving water and labor too.
- Cut back on the watering, and maintenance, of the thirsty grass in your lawn. Replace the grass with the foliage and flowers of ground covers.

Berry Compote--a perfect patriotic dessert for you Memorial Day Cookout



- ½ cup sugar
- 1 (6-ounce) basket fresh raspberries
- 1 (6-ounce) basket fresh blueberries
- 1 (6-ounce) basket fresh blackberries
- 1 pint fresh strawberries, hulled and quartered
- 1 store-bought pound cake, cut into six 1 ½ inch slices
- 3 tablespoons unsalted butter
- Whipped cream for serving (optional)

Cooking Directions

To make the berry compote, bring the sugar and ½ cup water to a boil in a small saucepan over high heat, stirring to dissolve the sugar. Let the syrup cool. Combine the raspberries, blueberries, blackberries, and strawberries and stir in enough of the syrup to sweeten the berries to taste. Cover and refrigerate for at least 2 hours and up to 8 hours. Prepare an outdoor grill for direct cooking over medium-low heat (350°F).

Brush the cooking grate clean and lightly oil the grate. Spread the butter over both sides of the pound cake slices. Place the cake slices on the grill. Cook, with the lid closed as much as possible, turning once, until lightly browned on both sides, about 4 minutes. For each serving, place a cake slice on a plate and top with the berries and their juices. Add a dollop of whipped cream, if desired. Serve immediately.

Orange Olive Oil Cake **Melissa dArabian, Food Network**

Prep time: 10 min
Cook time: 30 min
Serves: 8

Ingredients

Butter, for greasing the pan
1-1/4 cups all-purpose flour, plus more for the pan
3/4 cup sugar
2 eggs
1/3 cup olive oil (any type)
1 tsp vanilla extract
Juice and zest of 1 orange (about 3 tbsp juice, 1 tbsp zest)
1 tsp baking powder
1/2 tsp baking soda
1/2 tsp salt
Confectioner's sugar for dusting



Directions

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Grease and flour a 9-inch round cake pan.

Mix together the sugar and eggs in a medium bowl with a hand mixer on medium speed until blended and light. Drizzle in the olive oil and vanilla and mix until light and smooth. Add the orange juice and zest and mix well. Sift together the flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt in another medium bowl. Add the flour mixture half at a time to the wet ingredients and mix on low just to incorporate. Pour into the prepared cake pan and bake 25-30 minutes. Let the cake cook 15 minutes, then dust with confectioner's sugar and serve.



***Brunnera macrophylla* 'Jack Frost'** 2012 Perennial Plant of the Year™ selected by the Perennial Plant Association


Brunnera macrophylla 'Jack Frost' PP13859 grows 18
inches tall and 18 inches wide in a mounded form.
Brunneras are treasured for their shade tolerance and
early baby-blue, forget-me-not like flowers. *Brunnera*
macrophylla 'Jack Frost' has enchanting silvery leaves
with green venation and a thin green margin. One



common name for this perennial is heartleaf brunnera because the emerging leaf enlarges to a heart shape.

- **Light** - Plants thrive in the shade is essential, particularly in southern gardens.
- **Soil** - This perennial performs best in shady areas with good moisture retentive soils.
- **Uses** - ‘Jack Frost’ brunnera may be used along the front of the shade border, is excellent in a container, or can be combined with other ground cover perennials such as hostas, ferns, and epimediums. The silver foliage lights up a dark garden from spring to fall.
- **Unique Qualities** - From mid to late spring, blue, forget-me-not like blossoms are held in clusters several inches above the brilliant frosty silver leaves. The rough leaf texture makes this perennial less palatable to browsing deer.
- **Hardiness** - USDA Zones 3 to 8
